Washington – Since 1975, the National Association for Bilingual Education (NABE) has been a national non-profit, non-partisan, education membership organization in Washington, D.C. working to advocate for educational equity and excellence for bilingual/multilingual students in a global society.

NABE has over 20 national and international affiliates working to improve instructional practices for our nation's 4.7 million Dual Language and English Language Learners. NABE is committed to provide bilingual educators with more high-quality professional development opportunities; secure adequate funding for programs serving Bilingual/Multilinguals and English Learners; and keep the rights of language-minority Americans clearly in focus as states and communities move forward with educational reforms. Texas Representative Roberto R. Alonzo

"No hay que llegar primero sino que hay que saber llegar."

Roberto R. Alonzo was officially sworn in to start his ninth 2-year term as a Texas State Representative on Tuesday, January 10, 2017, having been first elected in November 1992, starting his first term during the 73rd Regular Session in 1993. He has also served during the 74th (1995), 78th (2003), 79th (2005) 80th (2007), 81st (2009), 82nd (2011), and 83rd (2013) Regular Sessions. State Rep. Alonzo serves House District 104 in the Legislature, which is in southwest Dallas primarily including the communities of Oak Cliff, Cockrell Hill, Northeast, South and East Grand Prairie, North Oak Cliff, West Dallas, Arcadia Park, as well as a portion of South Irving. When Rep. Alonzo was first elected he made history by becoming the first Mexican American from North Texas elected to the Legislature, outdistancing his opponent by a 2 to 1 margin with over 66% percent of the vote. Making history is nothing new to Rep. Alonzo. In 1978, as a college student, Rep. Alonzo became the first Hispanic elected President of the Student Government at the University of Texas at Austin. The Austin campus today enrolls over 50,000 students in its 16 colleges and universities.

On July 7, 1993, Rep. Alonzo once again made Texas history when Governor Ann Richards signed HB 1261 into law – the first piece of legislation authored by the Dallas freshman representative, creating the Texas Partnership and Scholarship Program (TPSP). Gov. Richards' signature of HB 1261 at the time made the TPSP the first program of its kind in the country modeled after the "I Have A Dream" Foundation of New York to be attempted on a statewide scale. The TPSP is a cooperative partnership effort between business, schools, and communities working together to provide mentoring/counseling programs and college scholarships for financially-needy students. Education has consistently been one of Rep. Alonzo's legislative priorities.

In addition to HB 1261, in 1993, he authored HB 982 which provided over \$8.2 million in scholarship monies from already-existing sources to financially-needy students attending college in Texas. During the 1993 session, as a member of the House Urban Affairs Committee, Rep. Alonzo worked closely with other legislators to pass one of the most significant packages of gang-related legislation ever passed in Texas to combat crime problems among our state's teens and youth. During his first 2 terms, he also served on the House Transportation Committee, working on a number of important legislative measures that impacted positively the State's transportation system, including improvements to our roads, highways, and interstate thorough fares.

In addition to his Vice Chairmanship of the House Pensions Committee, currently (83rd Session, 2013), Rep. Alonzo also serves on the powerful Calendars Committee, as well as the Higher Education & House Administration Committees. He also currently serves as 1st Vice President of the National Labor Caucus. During the 2009-2011 session, he served on the House Committees on Higher Education and Judiciary & Civil Jurisprudence. During the 2009 interim, he was also appointed by House Speaker Joe Straus to serve on the Texas Judicial Council, the Texas Indigent Defense Commission, as well as the Select Committee on Transportation Funding. Additionally, since 2010 he served as Chairman of the International Relations, Trade & Immigration Task Force of the National Hispanic Caucus of State Legislators (NHCSL) to which he was appointed by Illinois State Senator Iris Y. Martinez who served as the NHCSL President I 2010.

Among the legislative highlights of Rep. Alonzo was the 78th Regular Session in 2003 when he secured funding to set up the Alonzo Bilingual/ESL Education Scholars Program at the University of North Texas (UNT) to provide tuition assistance and loan forgiveness for students to pursue bilingual education teaching certification during every session until 2011. Until then the program received close to \$1.5 million to issue scholarships to over 125 college students pursuing teacher certification in bilingual education. In 2015 UNT received \$248,127 providing financial assistance to 30 more students bringing the total to 155 students receiving scholarship support. During that year, the program was expanded to include six more North Texas public universities and each received \$248,127 from the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

Additionally, Rep. Alonzo wanted to ensure that diversity will be a valued goal at both the local and state government levels. Thus, he amended and helped successfully pass legislation to ensure that appointments to local governing bodies are representative of their constituencies. In addition, he helped pass a comparable measure so that all appointments to statewide governing bodies reflect the racial, ethnic, and geographic diversity of the state. Rep. Alonzo worked closely with key legislators on this important affirmative action legislation, namely State Rep. Warren Chisum of Pampa and State Rep. Pete Gallego of Alpine. Finally, he fought to keep the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) from repealing a section of law that encourages the use of disadvantaged businesses, such as those with minority ownership, in contract bidding.

In addition to his legislative duties, civic affairs, and active political involvement in the community, Rep. Alonzo is an attorney by profession. A former migrant worker born and raised in Crystal City, Texas, in a family of 11 siblings, he graduated from Crystal City High School where he also served as his Student Body President and worked summers and after school in the town's legal aid center. In 1973, he sat on the Crystal City Independent School District Board of Trustees as a Student Representative. This active involvement as a young teen was the first sign that later encouraged him to pursue a career as an attorney. At the encouragement of his high school teachers, he left the small south Texas town to pursue an undergraduate degree at UT-Austin on an academic scholarship graduating with a B.A. degree in 1980. From there, he continued his law studies at the Thurgood Marshall School of Law at Texas Southern University in Houston where he obtained his Doctor of Jurisprudence in 1984. Rep. Alonzo is currently a self-practitioner and small business owner in Dallas where he specializes in criminal law.





Dr. Arnhilda Badía - President, José Martí Foundation

Dr. Arnhilda Badía, former Professor at Florida International University, has devoted her life to advocacy for minority students by promoting educational equity. With over 35 years of experience in teacher education, she has expertise in a wide variety of specialties including language policy, linguistics, language acquisition, and curriculum development.

Dr. Badía served as Florida State Representative from 1984 to 1988 and was able to pass important legislation that had a great impact on the education of English language learners and in the education of Hispanic students. She is the author of the José Martí Scholarship Challenge Grant, a fund managed by the Florida Department of Education, specifically for Hispanic students enrolled in public and certain private institutions in Florida. This is a needbased scholarship that is awarded based on the student's cumulative grade point average (GPA). The grant fund amount is determined by private donations as well as funds that are allocated by the Florida Legislature.

Dr. Badía obtained her Bachelor's Degree from Meredith College and received her Master's Degree and Ph.D. from the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill in Modern Languages and Linguistics. She completed a post-graduate degree at Harvard University in Educational Leadership. Dr. Badía is the author of several series of textbooks for children and adults. She is the President of the José Martí Foundation and belongs to several boards that focus on the importance of bilingual and multicultural education.





Eduardo J. Padrón, Ph.D. - President, Miami Dade College

An American by choice, Eduardo Padrón arrived in the United States as a teenage refugee in 1961. Since 1995, he has served as President of Miami Dade College (MDC), the largest institution of higher education in America with more than 165,000 students. He is credited with elevating MDC into a position of national prominence among the best and most recognized U.S. colleges and universities. An economist by training, Dr. Padrón earned his Ph.D. from the University of Florida. In 2009, TIME magazine included him on the list of "The 10 Best College Presidents." In 2010, Florida Trend magazine placed him on the cover of its inaugural "Floridian of the Year" issue. In 2011, The Washington Post named him one of the eight most influential college presidents in the U.S. Also in 2011, he was awarded the prestigious 2011 Carnegie Corporation Centennial Academic Leadership Award.

In 2012, he received the Citizen Service Award from Voices for National Service, the coveted TIAA-CREF Hesburgh Award for Leadership Excellence, and the Aspen Institute Ascend Fellowship. In 2015, he was inducted into the U.S. News & World Report STEM Hall of Fame. Dr. Padrón's energetic leadership extends to many of the nation's leading organizations. He is the past chair of the board of directors of the American Council on Education (ACE) and is a past chair of the board of the Association of American Colleges and Universities (AAC&U) and former chair of the Business Higher Education Forum (BHEF). He also served on the American Academy of Arts & Sciences' Commission on the Humanities & Social Sciences.

President Padrón is widely recognized as one of the top educational leaders in the world and is often invited to participate in educational policy forums in the United States and abroad. In 1993, President Bill Clinton recognized him as one of America's foremost educators. President George W. Bush nominated him to the National Institute for Literacy Advisory Board and the National Economic Summit. More recently, he represented the U.S. at UNESCO's World Conference on Higher Education at the invitation of the Obama administration, and President Obama appointed him Chairman of the White House Commission on Educational Excellence for Hispanic Americans.

During his career, he has been selected to serve on posts of national prominence by five American presidents.

Internationally, President Padrón's accomplishments have been recognized by numerous nations and organizations including the Republic of France, which named him *Commandeur* in the *Ordre des Palmes Académiques*; the Republic of Argentina, which awarded him the *Order of San Martin*; and Spain's King Juan Carlos II, who bestowed upon him the *Order of Queen Isabella*, and Spain's Prince and Princess of Asturias, Felipe and Letizia, who presented him with the *Juan Ponce de Leon 500th Anniversary* award.

Dr. Padrón's pace-setting work at Miami Dade College has been hailed as a model of innovation in higher education. He is credited with engineering a culture of success that has produced impressive results in student access, retention, graduation, and overall achievement. MDC enrolls and graduates more minorities than any other institution in the United States, including the largest numbers of Hispanics and African-Americans. He is nationally respected for his advocacy on behalf of underserved populations in higher education, and his indepth research report, "A Deficit of Understanding," highlights the funding crisis that threatens access for low-income and minority students. Dr. Padrón has also championed innovative teaching and learning strategies and developed support initiatives to ensure student success. He was a member of the Association of American Colleges and Universities' (AAC&U) Greater Expectations national panel that re-examined baccalaureate education in the U.S. and the Woodrow Wilson Foundation's Commission on the High School Senior Year. More recently he has been called upon to co-chair the Century's Foundation's Task Force on Preventing Community Colleges from Becoming Separate and Unequal. He also serves on the National Commission on Higher Education Attainment; CFR Task Force on U.S. Education Reform and National Security; National Governors Association's Advisory Group for College Completion Initiatives; and ACE Blue Ribbon Panel on Global Engagement.

Eduardo J. Padrón, Ph.D. - President, Miami Dade College

President Padrón's transformational accomplishments at Miami Dade College have been acknowledged by the national media including *The New York Times*, *The Washington Post, NBC Nightly News, TIME* magazine, *Wall Street Journal, CNN*, and *The Chronicle of Higher Education*.

He serves on the boards of the Council on Foreign Relations; RC 2020; White House Fellows Southern Region Selection Panel (Chair); the International Association of University Presidents; and Achieving the Dream. In past years he has held leadership positions on the boards of the Federal Reserve Board of Atlanta, Miami Branch (past Chair); the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching; Hispanic Association of Colleges & Universities (Chair); the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts; the White House Commission on Educational Excellence; Campus Compact; Congressional Hispanic Caucus Institute; The College Board; and the White House/Congressional Commission of the National Museum of the American Latino.

In Florida, Dr. Padrón has served on several gubernatorial commissions and has lent his talents to numerous organizations including the Florida Humanities Council; the Florida Council of Presidents (Chair); the Council of 100; Dade-Miami Criminal Justice Council (Chair); Miami Parking Authority (Chair); the Hispanic American League Against Discrimination (Chair); NAACP (Vice-President); and Greater Miami United (Co-Chair).

Under Dr. Padrón's leadership, Miami Dade College has received national recognition for its longstanding involvement with its urban community, its catalytic effect for social and economic change, and the marked difference the College has made in student access and success through pace-setting initiatives. The most recent recognitions include: 2011 CHEA "Award for Outstanding Institutional Practice in Student Learning Outcomes"; 2010 The Washington Center "Higher Education Civic Engagement Award"; 2010 The College Board "College Keys Compact for Learning Outcomes Initiative"; 2008 Association for General & Liberal Studies "Exemplary Award for Improving General Education"; 2008-11 "U.S. President's Higher Education Community Service Honor Roll"; and 2008 National Center for Digital Education "Fourth Best College for Digital Transformation."

He is the recipient of numerous honorary doctorates and prestigious awards. The recent list includes the 2016 Presidential Medal of Freedom Award; 2012 Aspen Institute/Ascend Fellowship; 2012 University of Texas "John Roueche International Leadership Award"; 2012 Greater Miami Chamber of Commerce "Sand In My Shoes" Award; "2008 Charles Kennedy Equity Award," Association of Community College Trustees (ACCT); "2008 Reginald Wilson Diversity Leadership Award," American Council on Education; "2008 Innovator of the Year," League for Innovation in the Community College; Chair Academy for Leadership Development's "2005 Paul A. Elsner Award for International Excellence;" Hispanic Magazine's "2004 Hispanic Achievement Award in Education"; and the Association of Community College Trustee's "2002 Chief Executive of the Year" award. He is a prolific writer with countless publications to his credit and has served on the editorial boards of *The Presidency*, *University Business*, and *Campus Technology*.

He has been featured in *People* magazine as one of the world's most influential Hispanics, in *Hispanic* magazine's list of most powerful Latinos, and in *PODER* magazine's report on "Movers and Shakers."





John B. King, Jr., Former Secretary of Education

John B. King, Jr. is the former secretary of education, a position he assumed upon Senate confirmation on March 14, 2016. In tapping him to lead the U.S. Department of Education, President Obama called Dr. King "an exceptionally talented educator," citing his commitment to "preparing every child for success" and his lifelong dedication to education as a teacher, principal, and leader of schools and school systems. As secretary, Dr. King brings a continued commitment to advancing excellence and equity for every student, supporting educators and elevating the teaching profession, and improving college affordability and completion rates.

Before becoming secretary, Dr. King served since January 2015 at the Department as principal senior advisor. In that role, he carried out the duties of the deputy secretary, overseeing all preschool-through-12th-grade education policies, programs, and strategic initiatives, as well as the operations of the Department. Dr. King carried out this work with a focus on increasing equity, improving educational outcomes for all students, and closing achievement gaps through implementation of key administration priorities in areas including early learning, elementary and secondary education, special education, English language acquisition, and innovation.

In performing the duties of the deputy secretary, Dr. King also oversaw the Department's work leading crossagency collaboration for President Obama's My Brother's Keeper task force, which seeks to address persistent opportunity gaps faced by boys and young men of color, and to ensure that all young people are able to reach their full potential.

Prior to his arrival at the Department, Dr. King served since 2011 as the commissioner of education for the state of New York. In that role, he served as chief executive officer of the State Education Department and as president of the University of the State of New York, overseeing the state's elementary and secondary schools (serving 3.1 million students), public, independent and proprietary colleges and universities, libraries, museums, and numerous other educational institutions. Dr. King was one of the nation's youngest state education leaders at the time of his appointment and the first African-American and Puerto Rican to serve as New York State education commissioner.

As commissioner of education, Dr. King worked with the Board of Regents to pursue an ambitious education improvement agenda. During his tenure, New York State was a national leader in many facets of education: investing in high-quality early learning; raising standards for teaching and learning; supporting teachers and school leaders through strong professional development, access to rich instructional resources, and innovative educator career ladder models; expanding career and technical education in high-demand fields; and increasing educational opportunity for students in the highest-need communities. Under Dr. King's leadership, New York deepened collaboration between the state's preschool-through-12th-grade (P-12) schools and its institutions of higher education, including strengthening teacher and principal preparation, and raising the bar for teacher and principal certification.

John B. King, Jr., Former Secretary of Education

Dr. King brings to his role extensive experience leading urban public schools that are closing the achievement gap and preparing students to enter, succeed in, and graduate from college. Prior to his appointment as senior deputy commissioner at the New York State Education Department in 2009, Dr. King served as a managing director with Uncommon Schools, a non-profit charter management organization that operates some of the highest-performing urban public schools in New York, New Jersey, and Massachusetts. Earlier in his career, Dr. King was a co-founder and co-director for curriculum and instruction of Roxbury (Massachusetts) Preparatory Charter School. Under his leadership, Roxbury Prep became one of the highest-performing urban middle schools in the state, closed the racial achievement gap, and outperformed not only the Boston district schools but also schools in the city's affluent suburbs. Dr. King began his career in education teaching high school social studies in San Juan, Puerto Rico and Boston, Massachusetts.

Dr. King earned a Bachelor of Arts in Government from Harvard University, a Master of Arts in the teaching of social studies from Columbia University's Teachers College, a J.D. from Yale Law School, and a Doctor of Education degree in educational administrative practice from Columbia University's Teachers College. Dr. King was a 1995 Truman Scholar and received the James Madison Memorial Fellowship for secondary-level teaching of American history, American government, and social studies. Prior to joining the Department, in February 2011, Dr. King was appointed by U.S. Secretary of Education Arne Duncan to serve on the U.S. Department of Education's Equity and Excellence Commission. In addition, Dr. King served on the board of New Leaders for New Schools from 2005 to 2009, and is a 2008 Aspen Institute-New Schools Entrepreneurial Leaders for Public Education Fellow.



Dr. King's life story is an extraordinary testament to the power of education. Both of Dr. King's parents were career New York City public school educators, whose example serves as an enduring inspiration. Dr. King's parents both died from illness by the time he was 12, and he struggled to cope with their loss as he moved between family members and schools. He credits New York City public school teachers — particularly his teachers at P.S. 276 in Canarsie and Mark Twain J.H.S. in Coney Island — for saving his life by providing transformative educational experiences and giving him hope about the future. His belief in the centrality of educational opportunity to the American Dream and the vital necessity of second chances for our young people has its foundations in his own experience of overcoming so many challenges and going on to graduate from Harvard, Yale and Columbia and become a teacher and education leader.

For his leadership on issues of educational equity, King has been honored with the Ann S. Kheel Award from the New York Urban League, the Eugene M. Lang Lifetime Achievement Award from the "I Have A Dream" Foundation, the New York Immigration Coalition Builders of the "New" New York Award, and the Robin Hood Foundation Heroes Award.

California Senator Ricardo Lara

Senator Ricardo Lara (D-Bell Gardens) was elected with overwhelming support in November 2012 to represent the Southeast Los Angeles County cities of the 33rdSenate District. Raised in a blue collar immigrant household, Ricardo knows first-hand the challenges facing working families and is committed to improving the quality of life for all Californians.

Ricardo is one of the most influential members of the State Senate, chairing the powerful Appropriations Committee and serving as a member of the Energy, Utilities and Communications, Governance and Finance, Governmental Organization, and Banking and Financial Institutions committees.

An advocate for the environment, Ricardo created the California Clean Bus, Truck and Freight Program to encourage clean energy while investing in good jobs and authored legislation to create a state plan to address short-lived climate pollutants such as diesel soot, which are known to cause climate warming and negatively impact public health.

A champion for educational equity, civil rights and immigrant rights, Ricardo champions legislation that improves the quality of life for vulnerable communities. He has authored several first-in-the nation laws that recognize and invest in immigrant communities such as the California DREAM Loan Program, which helps undocumented students apply for loans to complete their higher education goals. Supporting California's entrepreneurial spirit, Ricardo's bill to update and expand access to professional licensing rules, regardless of immigration status, will stimulate local economies and create jobs.

Working his way through college as a teacher's assistant in an English immersion classroom, Ricardo believes that multilingual education in schools is important to giving California students the competitive economic and educational edge. That's why he authored the California Ed.G.E., or Education for a Global Economy Initiative, which will ask voters to revisit the state's English-only instruction mandate in public schools on the 2016 ballot.

Under his leadership as Chair of the Latino Caucus, the legislature passed AB60 to allow undocumented Californians to obtain driver's licenses. In the summer of 2014, he organized a fact-finding delegation to visit the Central American unaccompanied minors being held in Ventura County and was instrumental in securing \$3 million to be directed toward non-profit organizations providing legal representation to these children.

Ricardo's record in public service has been recognized at the local, state and national levels. President Barack Obama awarded him a "Champion of Change" at the White House and *The Los Angeles Times* named Ricardo the "Point man in the push for immigrant rights" in California. Upon winning his election in 2012, he made history by becoming the first openly gay person of color elected to the California Senate.

Ricardo earned his B.A. in Journalism and Spanish with a minor in Chicano Studies from San Diego State University.



Dr. José Agustín Ruiz-Escalante has dedicated part of his professional life to service to NABE in different capacities. His first involvement with NABE was in the 1979 conference in Seattle, WA. working on the conference organizing committee. He has been directly or indirectly participated with NABE since 1984. He served three terms as president of the Association and a total of nine years in the executive board. He has served as editor of *Perspectives*, since 2008.

Dr. Ruiz-Escalante's passion for bilingual education and NABE began in Tucson, AZ, where he was mentored by by some of pioneers and giants of bilingual education: Macario Saldate, Adalberto Guerrero, and Hank Oyama. These individuals and others provided his foundation for professional service to the field as well as a commitment to the community.

Dr. Ruiz-Escalante was born in México and came to the United Sates when he was 16 years-old. He attended public schools in Nogales and Tucson, Arizona. He graduated from the University of Arizona in with a B.A. in Political Science and Latin American Studies, and his M.Ed. is in Bilingual Education, while his doctorate is from d the University of Washington, where he was a Title VII Fellow.

Dr. Ruiz-Escalante began his professional career as a bilingual educator working in the bilingual department of Pima Community College, and he was a professor of bilingual education in Oregon and Texas. He retired from the University of Texas – Pan American in 2015 as full professor and currently is a professor of education at Prince Mohammad Bin Fahd University in Saudi Arabia.

Dr. José Agustín Ruiz-Escalante has a strong commitment to the establishment of dual language education programs in our public schools. It is through this type of a program that second language learners will fully developed academically. Dual language education will even the playing field for students that English is not their native language and will help schools close or eliminate the achievement gap.

"Opening the Door to Cross-Cultural Educación in Two-Way Immersion Programs"

Abstract

This comparative case study examined the question "What does cross-cultural *educación* (Valenzuela, 1999) look like in two-way immersion programs, and what factors influence that process?" at two schools. Using contact theory, I found that the programs had different strengths in regards to cross-cultural *educación*, as well as distinct ways of talking about difference. Nevertheless, the schools shared important characteristics associated with their shared context: pressure to integrate cross-cultural learning with Common Core literacy standards and a focus on the cultures of foreign countries. I argue that two-way immersion programs need to emphasize equity not only for speakers of non-English languages, but also diverse ethnic and socioeconomic groups, through broadening considerations for choosing program models, diversifying student and teacher populations, and teaching students to both learn about and care for different cultures in their "glocal" (Brooks & Normore, 2010) communities.

"The Complexity of Latino Male Bilingual Teachers' Experiences"


Abstract

This dissertation investigated the intersection of gender and ethnicity of Latino male bilingual elementary classroom teachers. Through a Latino Critical Theory (LatCrit) framework this study contributes to the literature of bilingual teacher research by placing at the center the complex experiences of elementary Latino male bilingual teachers in a predominantly female dominated field. Findings suggest that the three Latino male teacher participants were subjected to dominant narratives about their identities and judged through western ideals of masculinity. To persist in the profession they disrupt problematic norms by drawing on their lived bilingual and bicultural experiences to create caring pedagogical practices and spaces where their students can reap the benefits of having their languages and cultures recognized and embraced. Additionally, this dissertation study highlights the benefits of incorporating bilingual children's literature that focused on issues of language, immigration, race, class and gender to facilitate the acquisition of literacy.





NABE 2016-2017 Annual Report

Membership and Affiliates

- 1.1 NABE active membership is 4,200 as of December 2016.
- 1.2 21 Affiliates in 19 states and three foreign Affiliates in China, Mexico and Spain. Alaska, Arizona, California, District of Columbia, Florida (2 affiliates), Georgia, Guam, Idaho, Illinois, Kansas, Massachusetts, Maryland, Michigan, New Jersey, New Mexico, New York, Ohio, Oklahoma, Oregon, Texas and Washington State. Louisiana and Wisconsin were reactivated as NABE affiliates in 2016.
- 1.3 Supported efforts in 9 countries to become affiliates of NABE: Brazil, Costa Rica, Cuba, Jamaica, Peru, Panama, Puerto Rico, Dominican Republic, and Tanzania.
- 1.4 Invited five states and two territories to become new affiliates or reactivate affiliation to NABE: Connecticut, Kansas, Maryland, Nevada, North Carolina, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands.
- 1.5 Established 3 foreign affiliates in China, Mexico and Spain March thru October 2016. Drs. Santiago Wood and Rossana Boyd visited these three affiliates to meet with members and participated on international education panels to discuss bilingual/dual language education.
- 1.6 Updated the Handbook for NABE Affiliates.
- 1.7 Improved and expanded the NABE membership by more frequent contacts using improved technology.
- 1.8 Board and Executive Director increased its relationships with Affiliates by attending and supporting their annual conferences.

2. NABE Board and Office Operations

- 2.1 Adopted NABE's new Mission Statement in 2016 that is in alignment with current educational needs and context.
- 2.2 Increased collaboration and efficiency among board members by using an online platform for storing and creating documents. Converted to the use of Zoom for all conference meetings.
- 2.3 Re-organized the NABE Operation into three physical sites (DC Metropolitan Area, Louisiana and Florida) for cost savings, greater accountability, improved supervision and accountability, and consolidation of certain services.

- 2.12 Strengthened and increased both the quality of research articles, circulation and subscription of the NABE Premier Bilingual Research Journal (BRJ)
- 2.13 Re-assigned and strengthened the NABE Journal of Research and Practice.
- 2.14 Improved and expanded circulation of the NABE weekly eNews to over 10,000 weekly.
- 2.15 Improved and expanded the education and technology marketing efforts on the NABE Webpage and via constant contact.

3. NABE Annual Conference and Summer Dual Language Professional Development

- 3.1 Adopted a new online program and APP for the NABE 2016 conference, which saved over \$15,000 in conference program printing costs.
- 3.2 Launched and continuing to refine and to improve the NABE conference webpage to process proposal submissions, conference registration and exhibitors' registration online.
- 3.3 The NABE 2016 Conference generated over \$500,000 in revenue to support NABE's operations.
- 3.4 NABE Executive Board Honored NABE Past Presidents and Trailblazers at the NABE 45th Annual Conference in Chicago. Fifteen out of the living twenty-five past presidents attended NABE 2016.
- 3.5 Increased conference attendees, also resulted in 100% increase in NABE membership as conference registration includes NABE membership fee.
- 3.6 Exhibitors increased by 20%
- 3.7 Instituted the Multimedia Student Contest for students in PreK 2 to demonstrate their bilingual/multilingual skills.
- 3.8 Recruited the largest delegation from China in the history of NABE to attend the NABE 45th Annual Conference. In addition, NABE 2015 Conference in Las Vegas also attracted teachers and students from Brazil, Canada, Chile, Dominican Republic, Mexico, Peru, Puerto Rico, and Spain.
- 3.9 Celebrated the Seal of Biliteracy at the NABE President's Reception.
- 3.10 Negotiated contracts for future conferences.

 - 2018 Albuquerque Convention Center, Albuquerque, NM
- 3.11 Hosted the first successful Summer Dual Language Institute in July 2015 in Wheaton, MD with more than 100 participants.
- 3.12 Planned the second successful Summer Dual Language Institute scheduled for Puerto Rico, June 27 and 28, 2016 at Ana G. Mendez Universidad del Este.





- 3.13 The Puerto Rican Secretary of Education was one of the keynoters who participated in the Symposium. The US Secretary of Education also provided video greetings to the participants.
- 3.14 The third Dual Language Symposium is planned for Palm Beach County on July 9-12, 2017.
- 3.15 Drs. Alma Flor Ada and Isabel Campoy are planning an Education and Cultural Program for Cuba in the Fall of 2017.
- 3.16 Dr. Alma Flor Ada and her family were recently honored by the Cuban Government with the dedication of a community library in their honor.

4. Advocacy (Educational, Institutional and Community Involvement)

NABE is proud to collaborate with its partners from the Hispanic Education Coalition (HEC) that unites more than 20 organizations dedicated to improving educational opportunities and outcomes for the more than 54 million Latinos and Latinas living in the United States and Puerto Rico. The HEC focuses on federal legislative issues relating to education including the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, the Head Start Act, the Higher Education Act, adequate federal funding for education, and the educational concerns of English learners. In each of these areas, the HEC strives to ensure that dialogue at the federal level regarding education issues reflects the education priorities of the Latino community:

- 4.1 Initiated a proposal with US Congressman Mike Honda that established April 2016 as National Bilingual/Multilingual Learner Advocacy Month.
- 4.2 Received a Congressional Resolution designating this very important initiative to recognize the contribution and important of being multilingual/biliterate and multicultural.
- 4.3 Initiated a strong partnership that has become a national campaign on "My Name, My Identity."
- 4.4 Worked with the US Department of Education OELA's Office on the first national ELL Recognition Conference to celebrate the 22 States who approved and passed the Seal of Biliteracy.
- 4.5 Established a strong partnership with American Federation of Teachers (AFT) as a main sponsor for the NABE Perspectives, the Dual Language Summer Symposium and the NABE National Conference. Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages (TESOL) International and the Joint National Committee for Languages-National Council for Languages and International Studies to conduct a national study with 40 educators, K-12 and university professors, that resulted in the first National Guidelines for the Seal of Biliteracy which was communicated to the U.S. Congress and the Council of





- Chief State School Officers for national distribution to all school districts and universities. The National Guidelines are available on the NABE web page.
- 4.6 Collaborated with members of the Hispanic Education Coalition (HEC), AFT, and TESOL International on numerous joint position statements and amendments, as well as attended and participated with numerous Congressional Education hearings to provide strong leadership and advocacy that resulted in the successful passage of the new Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) now known as the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) that preserved funding for English learner (EL) programs and increased professional development support for teachers of ELs.
- 4.7 Posted and shared numerous statements, letters and articles of strong positions on ESEA and solicited input from our membership, affiliates, supporters, sponsors and national experts during the process that led to the successful passage of the new ESEA.
- 4.8 Served as a member of the U.S. Secretary of Education Stakeholders Roundtable on ELs and as such participated on a quarterly basis with the Secretary and Dr. Libia Gil, Assistant Deputy Secretary of Education and Director of the Office of English Language Acquisition (OELA). NABE has supported a number of recommendations to improve services, equity and access to high quality programs for ELs.
- 4.9 Joined efforts with AFT to work with other coalitions on the following education and community initiatives on behalf of all teachers and students, with particular emphasis on ELs and those serving in highest needs schools:
 - 4.9.1 Advocated in partnership with HEC for passage of the DREAM Act, which did not pass at the federal level, but some version of which has passed in at least 20 states.
 - 4.9.2 Advocated to ensure Unaccompanied Children who are ELs can participate meaningfully and equally in educational programs.
 - 4.9.3 Supported Deferred Action for Childhood Arrival (DACA), which defers young people from deportation, granting a 2-year work permit and Social Security Number.
- 4.10 Joined Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities (HACU) as an affiliate member and as such provided letters of support to restore funding for the 409 Hispanic Serving Institutions (HSI).
- 4.11 Worked as a member of the Children's Leadership Council in providing letters of support for the Safe Child Nutrition Bill and Early Learners funding.
- **4.12** Served as a member of the AFT National Teacher Diversity Advisory Committee and presented at their National Diversity Panel.
- **4.13** Provided leadership as a Keynoter for the AFT 2015 National Teacher Academy.
- 4.14 Served as a member of the President's Advisory Subcommittee on Excellence in Education for Hispanics.
- 4.15 Signed a strong coalition letter supporting funding for Clean Water for Children and Families in Flint, Michigan.




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
